Mr Peter Bartholomew

MR PETER Hugh Bartholomew, who died yesterday at the age of 62, was president of his family's famous cartographic business, John Bartholomew & Son Ltd of Edinburgh.

Peter Bartholomew was educated at the Edinburgh Academy and was commissioned into the Scots Guards on leaving school. He had a distinguished military career during the latter part of the Second World War, attaining the rank of major and winning the Military Cross in Italy.

After the war, he qualified as a chartered accountant in Edinburgh, followed by a spell in London. In 1956 he returned to Edinburgh to take up the reins of the family business, succeeding his father as the fifth generation chairman. During his forties, he suffered more than one heart attack and had to take an increasingly

less active part in the business. He steadfastly refused to succumb to the ill-health which plagued him and continued to take an active interest in a wide range of activities.

As a young man, Bartholomew was a fine rugby player for his school and later, for London Scottish. He was a member of the Queen's Bodyguard for Scotland, the Royal Company of Archers, where he several times won the Queen's Prize for archery.
